

- Achieving wider impact which is not limited to the society residents only. These societies have become a guide and model for other societies to learn and adopt from.



An innovative cleanliness programme which became a movement!

We at ICICI Bank drew inspiration from Swachh Bharat Abhiyan for social change, and contributed to the cleanliness drive through various efforts, starting with a drive to clean the area around our branches.

More than 3,800 employees across 112 cities have contributed towards this drive. In a span of two years the vision for a clean and hygienic India has struck a deep chord, and from this was born India's first inter-housing society contest. This marked a step further from clean branches to a cleaner society.

Swachh Society Awards was launched in July 2016 to recognise, inspire and celebrate excellence in cleanliness, safety and adoption of green technology in housing societies in the Mumbai metropolitan region. During the course of the programme (55 days), the participating societies did a cleanliness makeover, submitted their responses to a comprehensive questionnaire - highlighting the various initiatives undertaken by them to create a clean, green and safe society.

More than 7,000 housing societies in the Mumbai metropolitan region joined the cause of clean India by participating in Swachh Society Awards.

Here is a collection of how housing societies are un-trashing the future, literally!







Turning the spoil into soil.

The residents of Tarangan Towers Society in Thane were determined to make a difference in the field of waste management. What germinated as a thought is now a full-fledged campaign. The focus is not only on waste segregation but also on management of waste at the society level. For this, the society has implemented vermicomposting, bio-composting and a system for biogas.









And the awareness was not just contained within the society premises. They invited members from other societies and held workshops and demonstrations to encourage them to adopt similar methods. Their efforts have received a great deal of attention from institutes and local municipal authorities. The society is a great example of how a community can be brought together in an effort to develop more eco-friendly measures on a large scale.







Mahindra Eminente Society Goregaon, Mumbai.

Determined towards a green society.

To make their society green, Mahindra Eminente Society in Goregaon initiated kitchen gardening and waste management in their society premises. This was prompted by a daily generation of large amounts of household and green waste from the society's vast landscape.











Championing and spreading the zero-garbage concept.

Vijaynagar Co-operative Housing Society in Andheri (E) has shown the way forward to waste management by involving the entire community. It has become a zero-garbage society in true spirit. It's a 50-year-old, large society, with 515 households and a population of more than 2000 people.

In October 2014, the society committee conducted a brain storming session with resident volunteers to manage the garbage menace in the society. They created a core team and started the zero-garbage project. Since then, the team of 93 residents and 37 young volunteers has been actively involved in making the project successful.











Flower Valley Complex Co-op Housing Society Ltd. Thane.

Absolute composting and zero wet-waste.

Flower Valley Complex Co-operative Housing Society Limited, located in Thane, is an excellent example of community participation towards environment protection and waste management. The society is more than 10 years old and has taken steps towards absolute composting of wet waste. They built a vermicompost pit, a bio-compost pit, and a biogas plant as well with help of an NGO named 'Hariyali'.







The society has been instrumental in not only implementing these initiatives, by themselves, but also spreading this awareness among others. To do this, they invite members from other societies or approach them as a team. Students from schools and colleges are also invited for composting technique demonstrations. Apart from this, children from the society prepared more than 5000 saplings, of which few were planted in the society garden while others were planted around by the Thane Municipal Corporation.



Water Conservation

Water conservation at the forefront.

Mercury Housing Society in Airoli is a small society with a big heart and with an even bigger cause. They aim for the betterment of not just self but others, too! Their aim is to achieve a level of water conservation that can be replicated by others to achieve the same, or even better results.









Saving water and keeping mosquitoes away.

Tucked away from the hustle and bustle of the busy streets of Marol is Blossom Co-operative Housing Society. Run by families of older members, the society boasts of greenery and eco-friendliness throughout the property. They are dedicated to maintaining themselves as naturally as possible. This led them to come up with an innovative, eco-friendly and chemical-free way to tackle the problem of mosquito breeding.











Saving every drop of water.


Due to the increasing global warming and severe drought situation in recent years in Maharashtra, Hill Grange Society took up the responsibility of saving every drop of water in their society.








Apart from spreading awareness about reducing the usage of water and avoiding wastage, the society committee installed water aerators in the taps of all households, reducing the flow and thereby conserving a large amount of water. With such deep-rooted conservation, there is no doubt that this society will soon be counted among the role models of this cause.

With clean technology, these societies are saving electricity and the earth, too!








Harnessing renewable energy sources.

With dedicated efforts over the years, Sealine Co-operative Housing Society Limited has truly demonstrated the value of harnessing solar and wind energy. A small society located in Khar - totaling 11 households, the society has several sets of photovoltaic cell panels that produce a total of 2.2 kWh of electric power per day. A windmill installation produces another 1.8 kWh of power, bringing the total power production to 4 kWh per day.







Sealine Society has become a working model for green facilities and is regularly visited by other interested societies and schools/institutes to learn about their environmentally friendly ways.





Prioritising Energy Saving.

For a society that houses more than 400 families, reducing electric energy consumption is a herculean task. But Mahindra Splendour Co-operative Housing Society was determined to make it possible with equal support from the society committee and residents.

They started by cutting down on electric energy consumption of common lighting. Replacing the common lighting system in a society this big is generally conducted in a phase-wise manner. But understanding the need and evaluating the actual requirements, the society conducted an electrical audit through Ecofirst Services Ltd. The measures suggested were implemented on priority basis

A 500 plant terrace garden.

Mumbai, a highly populated city faces a never ending space crunch. Hence, it is imperative that innovative and efficient interventions are undertaken for environmental conservation and growth. Charleville Co-operative Housing Society Limited, in Churchgate, has set a stellar example of this. They have created and maintained a terrace garden which boasts of 50 different species that total to around 500 plants. All the species planted here are selected on the basis of minimum watering requirements and maintenance.

When you spread awareness, the community grows together. Here are some stellar examples of those who reached out to their neighborhood and made a change.








Picking up the bits and pieces.

To bring the community together for this worthy cause, the society started a campaign known as "Pick up the Bits and Pieces".











Making the community garden in three hours!

Yes, it just took three hours for Anand Kores Society in Thane, to set up a community garden! The force behind this magic was the efforts of committed residents, including kids and volunteers from 'Green Souls,' a Mumbai-based group that promotes natural farming in the city, along with the use of permaculture methods. With permaculture, manure or compost can be made out of available organic waste.
