
Charity raising is encouraged through 'pledges'. Pledges are donations of any amount made by family, friends, colleagues, companies, associates, acquaintances of the runner, who wish to support his/her cause with their contributions.

**DREAM CHAMPIONS** are select individuals who commit to raising more than Rs.10 lacs in pledges for a charity of his/her choice. To be a Dream Champion, s/he has to make an upfront payment of Rs. 50,000 which is considered in the total minimum amount to be raised by the Dream Champion.

**DREAM TEAM** is a select group of individuals who commit to raising a minimum of Rs.1 lac upto Rs. 10 lacs in pledges, for a charity of his/her choice. To be a Dream Teamer, s/he has to make an upfront payment of Rs. 10,000 which is considered in the total minimum amount to be raised by the Dream Teamer.

**CORPORATE CHALLENGE** are a group of companies that contribute a minimum of Rs.2,34,000 and send a group of upto 30 employees to participate in the event. Each employee is motivated to raise any amount in pledges. A company signs up for the Event by making an upfront, non-refundable contribution of Rs. 234,000.

WE CARE are individuals who raise pledges of any amount and run for a cause they believe in.





The NGO supported? Project Crayons.

#### What motivated you to raise pledges for the same charity again?

The motivation for me is to give something back to society. The girl child is very close to my heart and also close to the heart of my friends and associates. Project Crayons shelter for the girl child "Udaan Ghar" houses 62 under-privileged girls, girls from broken and violent homes from the age of 5 to 13. If we want our nation to progress it is essential that a good education reaches all classes of society and primarily to girls, as they will give direction to their children. If today's girl child is not educated, then it will be difficult for them to guide their children fruitfully.

## Were the funds raised by you last year used the way you intended? What kind of feedback mechanism was used?

Last year the money I raised was for the purchase of an ambulance. The rest of the money was sponsored by Geodesic and the ambulance is running in the Mankhurd area. The ambulance is for the poor hutment dwellers who cannot afford ambulance service in case of medical emergencies. The ambulance details are available on Project Crayons' website.

## How did you go about raising money this year?

I sent an e-mail to all the people who have supported me earlier, plus to some I had missed out on. I explained in brief the purpose of raising funds, clearly mentioning the total proposed to be raised for whom it was being raised, giving the website details and powerpoint presentation of Project Crayons and a history of work they have done and continued to do. The response I got was along expected lines - as all my colleagues and friends believe that the money will be well spent.

#### How long did it take for you to raise pledges?

It took me approximately a month to raise the pledges and get the cheques.

## Was the current market situation an obstacle to the pledge raising process? If yes, can you give some experience?

No....though some did cite it for not contributing, but did promise to contribute next year.

## Utilization Of Funds By NGOs

## A Report: Aseema Charitable Trust

At the Standard Chartered Mumbai Marathon 2008, 5 Corporate Challenge teams, apart from individuals, participated in support of Aseema. Total funds generated were approx. Rs.17 lacs.

These funds were utilized primarily for the following projects:

### 1. Operational Costs at the Pali-Chimbai Municipal School, Bandra West

The funds raised by one of the corporates went towards covering the operational costs for Stds. V, VI and VII where Aseema runs its Primary Section. These costs covered the provision of academic facilities to children in these classes and included items such educational material and teaching aids, mid-day meals for the children, costs of excursions and payment of honoraria to the teachers.

In addition, for the all-round development of the child, Aseema provides additional facilities such as computer and art classes, yoga and drama, sports and judo to name a few. All costs for these facilities for the children from Stds V, VI and VII were also covered.

The concerned corporate not only raised funds for these activities but also visited the school on many occasions and encouraged its employees to organize special events for the children.

## 2. Preparation of the infrastructure at the Santacruz West Municipal Secondary School (first floor only)

The Santacruz School was adopted by Aseema in January 2008 and runs the Pre-Primary and Secondary Sections.

Funds from a corporate were used to repair and renovate the facilities on the floor which enabled Aseema to create the desired conditions for children to be at school. In the case of this corporate also, not only did the organization provide the funds but some of the employees even took time off on the weekend to actually help in the painting of the premises as their gesture of being engaged with Aseema in its work of providing quality education for under privileged children.

## A Report: Save the Children India

An amount of Rs. 3,76,000 was raised through the Standard Chartered Mumbai Marathon 2008.

The amount raised was used for the following projects:

## 1. Support 4 Balwadi's and 2 Study Center

In these Balwadi's 150 children were supported through an outreach and nursery program. This program ensures pre-primary education and provides assistance to children in BMC schools to upgrade their performance for acceptable standards through Comprehensive Study Centers.

## 2. One Vocational Center

Supporting 60 women by providing vocational training for young women living in urban slums of Mumbai to be socially and economically independent.

A short case study below shows the difference the vocational center brought in the life of a 20 year.

She came to know about the class when a survey was conducted in their area. Being a very enthusiastic and talented girl she joined the vocational skills in tailoring and embroidery. Encouraged by the organization, she got a chance to sell her articles in a large scale exhibition and thereon started taking orders. She says that her first earning was of Rs 1250/- when she stitched 125 Batwas in 10 days and was proud to support her family with that money.

Nanhikali has participated in the Standard Chartered Mumbai Marathon from its inaugural year. The platform of the marathon was initially used to raise awareness about the Nanhikali project-a national girl child education programme.

In 2007 for the first time Nanhikali obtained corporate participation for the marathon and since then it has been a great success. The funds raised through the marathon have benefited 1137 Nanhikali's through the following projects:

- Direct material support is extended to the girl child annually through a material kit consisting of Uniforms, school bag, shoes, socks, undergarments, notebooks and stationery.
- Direct non material support is extended through Gyan Jyothi centres or Academic Support Classes (ASC) which is run in schools attended by the Nanhi Kalis either prior to school or after school hours to ensure that children attending Govt Schools acquire grade specific learning competencies.
- Indirect support provided to teachers through teacher learning material, ongoing capacity building programmes etc. and Sensitizing parents and other stakeholders in community on gender equity and the importance of girl child education.
